Christmas Update


December was another busy Christmas season at CMC.

For three afternoons each week, more than 20 children come into CMC to learn the violin, viola or cello. Their instructors are highly qualified members of the Newfoundland Symphony Orchestra. While the children enjoy their lessons the parents sit in CMC's youth lounge, reading, knitting, chatting, connecting. Approximately once a month a special event is arranged. Guest musicians come in and perform and/or give workshops. Children perform for family and friends. Music brings people together. This happens here. We are so very proud to be part of this exciting program.
